

SERMON OF THE MONTH

"Putting Ourselves to the Test"

(Preached Sunday, September 24, 2023)

II Corinthians 13:5-9

Examine yourselves to see whether you are living in the faith. Test yourselves. Do you not realize that Jesus Christ is in you?—unless, indeed, you fail to pass the test! I hope you will find out that we have not failed. But we pray to God that you may not do anything wrong—not that we may appear to have passed the test, but that you may do what is right, though we may seem to have failed. For we cannot do anything against the truth, but only for the truth. For we rejoice when we are weak and you are strong. This is what we pray for, that you may become perfect.

Question- How do you define what it means to be a Christian? If I were to ask each one of you to define "Christian," I imagine we would come up with as many shades of definition as there are people in attendance.

If we go to the dictionaries: Webster defines Christian as "one who professes belief in the teachings of Jesus Christ" According to Oxford being a Christian is "based on or believing the teachings of Jesus Christ" And the new kid in town, Wikipedia, states "Christians are people who follow or adhere to Christianity, a monotheistic Abrahamic religion based on the life and teachings of Jesus Christ." Notice how each dictionary employed different verbs in their definition: profess, Believing, following, adhering to.

How about how the church itself defines "Christian." Here of course belief takes on a central role, but the definitions vary from one degree to another depending on which denomination we ask. Catholics define "Christian" as any person who is baptized and who believes in Jesus Christ. Baptists characterize Christians as those who believe in Jesus Christ as the Son of God, who came to earth to save humanity from sin. Presbyterians define Christians as those who believe that Salvation is by Grace through Faith in Jesus Christ, and Lutherans describe a Christian as one who believes that Jesus Christ, true Son of God, and true man, is the world's Savior from sin, death, and the power of the evil one. And so on.

So you see, various denominations render a definition of Christian that centers on one's belief. In short, whether or not one is a Christian comes down to what we choose to believe.

This may all sound good to us those of us who have been raised to think of faith as one's agreement to a certain set of religious principles centered on Jesus Christ, but when we get to the biblical definition of what it means to be a Christian, we discover it's about more than mere stated belief.

In Galatians chapter two, Paul gives us his definition of what it means to be a Christian: "I have been crucified with Christ; and it is no longer I who live, but it is Christ who lives in me." So you see, for Paul, being a Christian means more than agreeing to a doctrine of faith in Jesus Christ; it means actually having Jesus Christ living inside of us! Now, here's some good news for those of us who call ourselves Methodists: our founder John Wesley preached an identical definition of what it means to be Christian! In his sermon, "Almost Christian," Wesley preached that for a person to be Christian, they must be filled with holy love and have faith in Christ, and by "holy love," Wesley meant not a bigger version of human love, but Christ's perfect love living, as Paul wrote, inside us. Christ's perfect heart in place of our own flawed hearts. More on that later!

This naturally brings us to the really important question: How can you or I know for sure if we have Christ in us? After all, we can convince others, heck, we can even convince ourselves that we are Christian, but according to Paul, we can only make that claim if we truly have Christ living in us. How can we determine, beyond doubt, that our faith is more than just agreeing to a religious creed, but is actually the real deal? This was the very question that Paul raised in this morning's New Testament passage.

Like each of Paul's letters, II Corinthians was written to address an issue in the church at Corinth.

Paul, along with Silvanus and Timothy, had founded the Corinthian Church around the year 50 or perhaps a few years earlier. In the time since Paul wrote his letter we call I Corinthians, there was dissension in the church and many had fallen away from his teaching of the Gospel. This turmoil is what Paul is addressing in chapters 10-13 of II Corinthians. By revolting against the proclaimed Gospel upon which Paul built their church, they were in essence putting his teaching to the test. But in this letter, Paul effectively turned the tables and by doing so, taught those of us living 2,000 years later a valuable guide for coming to terms with our own faith! He writes...

"Examine yourselves...Test yourselves. Do you not realize that Jesus Christ is in you?—unless, indeed, you fail to pass the test!"

Here Paul is boldly challenging the members of the Corinthian Church to examine, to test their own faith in order to determine whether they have Christ living inside of them, or not. Pass the test and all is well. But fail the test, then no matter how many times one cries "Lord, Lord," no matter how well one is familiar with Jesus' teaching, no matter the times one *claims* to believe in Jesus Christ and him crucified, in Paul's eyes they still don't have it!

"Examine yourselves...Test yourselves," Paul writes, but he doesn't actually clue us in on what such a test would look like! So how can we examine ourselves to determine whether we actually are "Christian" according to Paul's understanding of the faith-having Christ in us?

What if such a test reveals that we really are just paying our faith nothing more than lip service, and we've been nothing more than hollow-hearted church-goers, the same religious types Jesus addressed in Matthew 23 when he cried, "Woe to you, scribes and Pharisees, hypocrites! For you clean the outside of the cup and of the plate, but inside they are full of greed and self-indulgence." How do we know for sure whether or not we are truly Christian?

For many it's simply a matter of our heart. "I just know I'm a Christian because that's what my heart tells me, and I always listen to my heart!" Sounds so wise, right? "Just follow your heart; it knows the way!" Sounds so beautiful, doesn't it? But here's the thing- is our heart the most accurate barometer as to whether or not we're a Christian? Well, if you pay attention to the following two things it is not!

First of all there's that passage from Jeremiah where the prophet stated so bluntly, "The heart is devious above all else; it is perverse— who can understand it?" The King James version of the passage sounds even less encouraging: "The heart is deceitful above all things, and desperately wicked." The word in the Hebrew translated devious/deceitful is aqob meaning "fraudulent, crooked, polluted." YIKES! And the word translated perverse/desperately wicked is anash which can also mean "incurable, sick, woeful." So yeah, according to scripture the heart is most untrustworthy to say the least!

The other place where we realize the heart's often deceptive nature is when we take an honest look back at our own lives! You know we like to romanticize and believe that every time we've followed our heart we ended up in a good place! But really?! Our memories can be pretty selective at times, right? I don't know about you, but if I'm honest with myself, there were just as many times following my heart got me into trouble as there were times things ended up on a positive note! Heck, if my heart was a reliable guide I would have been married when I was 16 and had a job as a railroad engineer because that's what my heart told me to do!

And think about the situation our country is in right now. It's so divided, and why?

Because we have two tribes and each of them are following what their hearts are telling them!

They can't both be right, and maybe neither of them are. Is there a way to test whether the choices we make as individuals, as a church, or as a country reflect having Christ in us, as Paul so challenged the Corinthians 2,000 years ago?

The answer is yes, there is, and it's found in the words of the very one whose presence is being tested! If we were to write up a test based on Jesus teaching as found in the Sermon on the Mount, for instance, it will at the very least give us a good indication whether we can claim the name "Christian."

For instance, how would we honestly answer the following 8 **TRUE OR FALSE** questions?

- 1. I believe I should go through life in a humble manner.
- 2. I have anger issues.
- 3. I prefer to keep my faith to myself.
- 4. I prefer to keep the amount of donations I give to the needy to myself.
- 5. I think it's possible to worship God and still strive to make a lot of money.
- 6. If my neighbor borrows something from me I don't pressure them to get it back
- 7. I am pessimistic about the future.
- 8. The Kingdom of God is my highest priority.

Are you finished? Okay let's turn in our tests and see how we've done!

- 1. I believe I should go through life in a humble manner. TRUE

 ["Blessed are the meek, for they will inherit the earth". Matthew 5:5]
- 2. I have anger issues. **FALSE**
 - ["I say to you that if you are angry with a brother or sister, you will be liable to judgment." Matthew 5:22]
- 3. I prefer to keep my faith to myself. FALSE
 - ["You are the light of the world. A city built on a hill cannot be hidden". Matthew 5:14]
- 4. I prefer to keep the amount of donations I give to the needy to myself. **TRUE**
 - ["Whenever you give alms, do not sound a trumpet before you, as the hypocrites do in the synagogues and in the streets, so that they may be praised by others. Truly I tell you, they have received their reward." Matthew 6:2]
- 5. I think it's possible to worship God and still strive to make a lot of money. FALSE
 - ["No one can serve two masters; for a slave will either hate the one and love the other, or be devoted to the one and despise the other. You cannot serve God and wealth." Matthew 6:24]
- 6. If my neighbor asks to borrow something from me I gladly lend it. TRUE
 - ["Give to everyone who begs from you, and do not refuse anyone who wants to borrow from you." Matthew 5:42]
- 7. I am pessimistic about the future. **FALSE**
 - ["Do not worry about tomorrow, for tomorrow will bring worries of its own. Today's trouble is enough for today." Matthew 6:34]
- 8. The Kingdom of God is my highest priority. **TRUE!**
 - ["Strive first for the kingdom of God and his righteousness, and all these things will be given to you as well." Matthew 6:33]

So, how did you do? In the words of Paul: "Do you not realize that Jesus Christ is in you?—unless, indeed, you fail to pass the test!" If you honestly answered each question and aced the test, that's a pretty good indicator you fit Paul's definition of what it means to be a Christian. You have Christ inside you. Well done! If you flunked, eh, not so much...

But here's the good news: God is always willing to give us a make-up test! But before we take it, we'll need to do some extra homework assignments. So let's study the teachings of Jesus, really study them. Then let's put those lessons to work, because if Christ is really inside us we cannot help to put our faith into action! In short, let us strive to perfect ourselves in love! Let's ace that test! Do that, then there's no doubt we'll hear Paul's words of encouragement: "This is what we pray for, that you may become perfect." Amen Paul, amen!
