SERMON OF THE MONTH

"Buried Gifts" Preached on Laity Sunday, October 17, 2021 **Matthew 25:14-30**

Have you ever given someone you care about a gift, maybe even a rather expensive gift, and then you <u>never see it again</u>?! they never wear it, or use it, or ride it, or anything it! After a while you might drop a hint that you're onto them! *"Hey Horace, my man, ehhhh, how are you liking that turtleneck sweater I bought you for your birthday?"* Horace, obviously quick on his feet responds, *"Love it Chuck! Love it just as much as the plaid vest you gave me last year!"* This gets worse than turtlenecks and vests though. Speaking for most of us guys, we know that no matter how many hours we put in at the mall, the majority of the jewelry we purchase for our significant others has a better than 90 percent chance of being buried, maybe not in the backyard, but in the back of some obscure drawer in a jewelry case, in some dusty, forgotten corner of the attic. And how does that make us feel, fellas? We think what a waste of time and income it was to give such an expensive yet neglected gift, right? We might even get a bit perturbed, mad even!

Now put yourself in God's place and you'll begin to empathize with this parable. God is the great giver of gifts, but the gifts God gives us aren't as material or ephemeral as jewelry or a plaid vest. God gives us gifts for living our lives. God gives us gifts who's function is to make this world a better place. God gives us gifts used to build God's Kingdom, to spread God's love around our neighborhood and around the world. But Saints, if we never put these gifts to action, well, God is not only disappointed, according to the parable that Stephanie just read, God gets a bit perturbed! Unlike Horace's turtleneck sweater, putting to use the gifts God gives us is not optional. In fact, according to this parable, we are to take these gifts and multiply them, make them stronger, during our time here on earth.

Today is Laity Sunday, a day when we not only honor the contributions of our numerous laity, but it is also a day to celebrate the gifts that God has blessed us with as we march forward in ministry, and no parable of Jesus so addresses the subject of God-given gifts as does the passage from Matthew 25. The master in the parable does two things here: first of all he "summons" his servants; calls them over. Second, he "entrusts" them with his estate. These two simple verbs, summoned and entrusted, define our covenant with God. Saints, every last one of us has been summoned, or called by God. And every last one of us has been entrusted with various responsibilities.

Note that each servant in the parable is given *a different <u>degree</u> of responsibility* dependent on their ability. That word we translate "ability" is the Greek word "*dunamis*" from the root "*dunamai*" meaning "able to" or "can do." In other words, that which a person is capable of doing. God recognizes that each servant has different degrees of capability. For that reason one of the servants was entrusted with five talents, another two, and the other just one. What's a talent, you ask? In Jesus' time a talent was a fixed amount of silver or gold, the equivalent today of around \$10,000- not pocket change, right?! Anyway, once his servants receive their talents the master backs his chariot out of the driveway, and they're are on their own…

So the drama ensues- we wonder, how will the servants handle their responsibilities by the time their master gets back home? Here Jesus story telling is pretty straight forward. The one entrusted with the five talents? Well he goes out and doubles them to ten! Must have bought some ancient Bitcoin! The one entrusted with two talents? He doubles that to four; not bad! Not as impressive as Bitcoin servant, but still not bad; he's like a "day trader" of talents! And then we

come to the servant entrusted with just the one talent. What did he do? Let's call him hole diggin' dude. Yeah, he buried his in the ground; never made a nickel!

So what do ya suppose is gonna happen when, after time away, the master pulls back into the driveway? It will all depend on what the servants have done with the talents they are entrusted with. First up-Bitcoin servant! Well he just struts right up to his master and says, "Check it out! You gave me five? Well here's five more! Ten altogether- Bazinga!" And the master tells him in, "You da man! You made me very happy" and gives the guy a big old hug. What about day trader servant? Well, even though he was less capable than Bitcoin guy, he nevertheless doubled his talents as well. And for doing that, for living up to his capabilities, he gets the exact same response from the master: "Come here you! You've proven yourself to be a darn good investor, so next time you're getting a promotion!" And another big hug ensues! Such a happy scene so far right? And next up? Uh oh- it's the hole-diggin' dude standing there with his one dirt-encrusted talent. And we know this ain't gonna end well! After seeing what his buddies did with their talents, he has a sinking feeling about this, so he skulks sheepishly up to his master, brushing the dirt of his one talent, and before his master can even say a word what's he do? Yep, starts making all kind of excuses! Unbelievably, the hole diggin' dude actually digs himself deeper, because he starts blaming his master for his actions! "Look sir, I knew that you're a harsh master, taking what isn't yours, scared me to death, so rather than risk losing it I dug a hole and put my talent in there for safe keeping Here, take it back, it's yours anyway; truth is, I never wanted it in the first place!"

Needless to say, this does not go over well with the big guy, not pleased, not pleased. But even 2,000 years later we are pretty shocked by his reaction! "Why you wicked, lazy, no-good sack o' poo! So I'm a harsh dude who takes what isn't mine? That's what you think of me? Well if that's the case, the least you could have done was get me some interest- put the talent in a bank maybe? But nooooooo! Gimme that talent! Hey Bitcoin servant, my man, here, you take it; I know you'll do great things given what you did with the other talents I gave you. But as for you-hole-diggin' dude- you can literally go to hell, where you will be tortured for, let's see..... ALL ETERNITY! And just like that the hole-diggin' dude is hauled off kickin' and screamin'!

See, I told you, that was harsh was it not? Seems at first like a bit of an overreaction, right? The Master cast him right into the outer darkness; no strike one, no strike two, just boom! I ask youwhat did he do to deserve that? Technically he committed no sin; broke no biblical law. I mean this guy didn't really *do* anything did he! He didn't do anything! He didn't do anything.... well that's sort of the point ain't it! He was punished to the fullest extent because he didn't do anything. He was summoned by his master, given one lousy talent, and he did nothing with it.

Let me ask you, can you think of anything more displeasing in the eyes of God? Do you know someone very famous once said, "*The hottest place in Hell is reserved for those who remain neutral in times of great moral conflict.*" Who said that? That person sounds as tough as the master in the story! Who said it? Give you a hint- it was the same person who also said, "*He who passively accepts evil is as much involved in it as he who helps to perpetrate it. He who accepts evil without protesting against it is really cooperating with it.*" Same person who said, "*History will have to record that the greatest tragedy of this period of social transition was not the strident clamor of the bad people, but the appalling silence of the good people.*" Yeah- it was Martin Luther King. Not exactly a person known for pontificating harsh judgment. But King, like others striving to build the Kingdom of God, recognized that the greatest enemy they confronted was not those who openly opposed them, rather those who were **capable** of helping, who had the **gifts** to help the cause, but who chose instead to bury their talent, sit on the sidelines, and do nothing.

You see Saints, that's why the punishment given to the one-talent slave is justified. He had the talent, but rather than put it to use, he buried it. He thought that simply *breaking even* was good enough when it came to serving his master. But Saints, is there anything sadder or more frustrating than talent wasted? Not according to Jesus. Then and now, the message he teaches his followers through this parable is simple, is it not? We are not put here on earth to "break even!" We are not put

here on earth to merely get by! Each one of us has been called on to leave this earth a better place than when we found it, to advance the Kingdom of God toward fulfillment, not spin our wheels in the dirt. And each one of us, according to our capabilities, has been entrusted with a certain talent or talents to make that happen. Some of us have five talent capability, others four talent, or three or two, or perhaps just one. We are not all equal in what we're capable of doing. *But* we *are* all equal in terms of our responsibility to employ the gifts we've been given to build the Kingdom.

Saints, if our religious life consists of nothing more than church on Sunday than we might as well be taking our talent and burying it in the cold hard ground. The parable of the talents teaches that such an apathetic life is not only unacceptable, it is abhorrent to God. According to Jesus himself, what is the worst sin we can commit? We're talkin' sin with a capital "S"? Is it not the failure to live out our calling, the failure to use the talent God has given us. The greatest sin for those of us who claim to be a follower of Jesus is to waste our gift. Wow Rev, that sounds harsh. It sure does. But how can we interpret this parable otherwise?

Just think about where Matthew placed this parable in his gospel-just before the Great Judgment. Just before when the Son of Man separates the good sheep from the bad goats, based entirely on *what*? Not on what we profess to believe, but by how we actually lived out our faith. Saints, we have been summoned to a purpose, entrusted with the gifts necessary to make it happen.

What happens when gifts go wasted? This happens... 'I was hungry and you gave me no food; I was thirsty and you gave me nothing to drink; I was a stranger and you did not welcome me; naked and you did not give me clothing; sick and in prison and you did not visit me." We had the food, had the drink, had the welcome mat, had the clothing, had the time to visit, had the gifts to make it all happen, but we chose instead to bury our gifts in the dirt, and our apathy, our failure to act, has a price.

But here's the good news Saints- it's never too late to answer God's call; never too late to start putting your considerable talents to good use! It's true, our God is righteous in his judgments, but God is above all, compassionate and forgiving! So if your talent is buried out back somewhere I have a suggestion: get the heck out there and dig it up, and start putting that talent into action! We have a lot of challenges before us as a church, as a nation, and as a world and God needs every last one of us to answer the call.

This Laity Sunday we indeed have much to celebrate when it comes to the capabilities of our church, do we not? Rest assured, God has witnessed the way so many of us have taken the talent he has given us and used it to build his Kingdom on earth, here in Edison. God is no doubt pleased when he see how so many of us have put the talents we been given to use. The gifts of teaching and administrating our Sunday School, Bible Studies, Youth Group, and Vacation Bible School. The gifts of sandwich making and those who gather every Friday morning to fill bags with balanced meals. Our volunteers who pick up meals from Wawa, and then distribute it. We celebrate the talents that uplift us in worship- gifts of music, liturgy, and technology as the service goes from here to our balcony then out into the world. God blesses those who use the precious gift of prayer every Wednesday morning in the Susannah Wesley room, as well as those who have the gift of maintaining and improving our buildings and grounds. Those who take care of our finances in the quiet of the office when no one's around, or count and care for the offering every week. And what about those who help out with coffee hour, or work the flea market, or welcome us to church every Saturday and Sunday?

Saints, we do a lot with our talents to be sure, compared to most churches we have a large percentage of members and friends who put their faith into action. But like the five talent servant of the parable, God believes we are capable of so much more! The big issue is not what have we done, but what we are capable of doing in the time ahead! As much as we celebrate what we've accomplished so far, if we do no find ways to multiply the gifts God has blessed us with it is the equivalent of burying our talent in the ground. It is not acceptable to God, nor should it be to us, to plan a future that is status quo or pessimistic in scale! If we set a goal let's make it a lofty one, so
