

### **SERMON OF THE MONTH**

## "The Sin of Gullibility"

(Preached on Sunday, February 28, 2021)

**Ephesians 4:1-7, 11-16** 

I therefore, the prisoner in the Lord, beg you to lead a life worthy of the calling to which you have been called, with all humility and gentleness, with patience, bearing with one another in love, making every effort to maintain the unity of the Spirit in the bond of peace. There is one body and one Spirit, just as you were called to the one hope of your calling, one Lord, one faith, one baptism, one God and Father of all, who is above all and through all and in all. But each of us was given grace according to the measure of Christ's gift.

The gifts he gave were that some would be apostles, some prophets, some evangelists, some pastors and teachers, to equip the saints for the work of ministry, for building up the body of Christ, until all of us come to the unity of the faith and of the knowledge of the Son of God, to maturity, to the measure of the full stature of Christ. We must no longer be children, tossed to and fro and blown about by every wind of doctrine, by people's trickery, by their craftiness in deceitful scheming. But speaking the truth in love, we must grow up in every way into him who is the head, into Christ, from whom the whole body, joined and knitted together by every ligament with which it is equipped, as each part is working properly, promotes the body's growth in building itself up in love.

Gullibility- is it a sin? Did you know that if you say the word "gullible" real slow it sounds exactly like "oranges?" Okay, to those of you who actually are trying this, my sincere apologies! I'd say the devil made me do it, but...well, you know! Why did some of you even try saying it? Was it because you trusted me? Silly rabbit!

We'll get back to the trust the preacher thing later on- trust me....(?) But in the meantime, have you ever been told, "You're so gullible?" We probably all have at one time or another, right? Not sure, but I don't believe that's ever meant as a compliment! I don't know about you, but doesn't there seem to be an awful lot of gullible people running around these days?! Seems like there's a lot of people who'll believe about anything. Despite everything the evidence suggests, there are a heckuva lotta people believing that the world is actually flat as a pancake, that our climate isn't changing, that COVID19 is a hoax, and that Elvis is still alive, "Yup, saw a picture of him in the supermarket paper pumping gas in Peoria!"

Wikipedia defines gullibility as "a failure of social intelligence in which a person is easily tricked or manipulated into an ill-advised course of action. It can also be defined as the tendency to believe unlikely propositions that are unsupported by evidence." While some people seem to be gullible by nature, every one of us has gone through a time or two in our lives when we're more gullible than normal, in other words, more vulnerable to be being fooled, tricked or scammed. Myself included! Case in point….

When I served a couple of churches in Salem County I used to love going to the Elmer Auction every Friday and one night, I was looking through the "merchandise" when I spotted a signed LeRoy Neiman sketch buried beneath some dirty old frames containing worthless prints. Well I don't know much but I knew anything signed by the artist LeRoy Neiman was worth hundreds, and if it was an original sketch we're talking thousands\$\$! So I waited patiently for an hour or so until the auctioneer got to the otherwise nondescript pile of frames and started the bidding at \$1. Well, somebody else must have seen the sketch because to my dismay the bidding started going up. I tried to see who was bidding against me but couldn't locate the competition. Finally, when the bids reached \$65 the other person dropped out and I had the Neiman! Even though it was more than I had hoped to spend, I was euphoric to get such a bargain. This would do so well on eBay! And then I got home and took the sketch out of the frame. Drum roll please.... UGH! It was a page torn out of a book, not a signed original sketch. The frame was worth more than the print. Oy vey! I felt like an idiot. How could I have been so gullible? Upon reflection, I figured out that it was because *I so wanted it to be a genuine Neiman sketch* that it clouded my judgment to the point that I never questioned the signature's authenticity.

That desire to *want something to be true* is perhaps *THEE* major influence when it comes to being gullible, but there are other factors as well:

*Ignorance* is also major- the less we know about something the more likely we are to get duped. Unscrupulous car mechanics or handymen often take advantage of clueless customers who don't have a basic

understanding of how things work.

Out and out laziness leads straight to gullibility, not taking the time, effort, or due diligence when it comes to making life decisions or buying something like a car for instance- Used car salespeople prey on gullible buyers wandering their lot!

**Desperation** is another factor. Panic might lead us to choices we normally wouldn't make and will one day regret.

Gullibility is also tied closely to weak critical thinking skills. Absence of healthy skepticism contributes to poor decision making. Cognitive research scientist, Hugo Mercier, writes that we humans have a tendency to readily accept unsupported or false statements so long as they support their preconceived beliefs. Think about how quickly, without even bothering to fact-check, most of us Facebook users are to like or share a post just because it supports our point of view!

And finally, here's a biggie: *putting one's trust in the wrong person!* That's the reason I did that silly gullible/oranges experiment at the beginning of the sermon! Let that be a lesson that you shouldn't put too much trust in us preachers! But seriously, think of all the gullible people who, despite the warning signs and numerous exposes' in the news, actually have put their trust in unscrupulous TV evangelists, those wolves in sheep's clothing who own multiple mansions and private jets; they send them their life savings for a 50 cent prayer cloth or a "ticket to heaven."

Misplaced trust not only makes us gullible, it can lead to disastrous consequences. Just ask the followers of cult leaders like Jim Jones, Marshall Applewhite, or David Koresh. Their followers put their complete trust in them and they ended up losing their lives.

And it's not just religion- unscrupulous con artists in all fields prey upon the gullible. Some politicians can literally say anything because they know their base will never ever abandon them. Of course lately in the news, most of the participants in the mob that attacked the Capitol placed their faith in an Internet presence known as Q, like an Old Testament idol, a person who claims to be an insider but who may not even exist, and now it looks like their misplaced trust not only revealed their gullibility, it will also be bringing them some serious jail time!

Yes, Saints, gullibility can lead us down roads we ought not be on; it can take our money; it can put us in prison; it can even kill us! But that said, is being gullible a sin? After all, that's what the title of the sermon is suggesting right? It's one thing to point out the dangers of gullibility, but is it being gullible actually a sin? For that let's turn to the Bible and in particular a passage from Ephesians, where that very question is addressed.

This morning's New Testament lesson came from a letter written to the church at Ephesus. What's interesting is that the earliest manuscripts we have of this epistle it never mention Ephesus, meaning that designation was probably added later. For that reason, most scholars believe it was originally written to a group of churches in Asia Minor, one of which may have been Ephesus, and that effects how we understand the contents of the letter. We know from reading the book of Acts as well as Paul's letters that in the first century the churches of Asia Minor were subjected to a wide variety of proselytes coming to town trying to spread their own ideas as to what it means to be a Christian. Many of their ideas clashed with what Paul himself had taught them. Needless to say this led to confusion, chaos, and schisms in the church.

No one was more concerned about this, or enraged by it, than was Paul himself! In his letter to the church in Galatia, the Apostle's frustration spilled over, pleading with church members, "I am astonished that you are so quickly deserting the one who called you in the grace of Christ and are turning to a different gospel— not that there is another gospel, but there are some who are confusing you and want to pervert the gospel of Christ... You foolish Galatians! Who has bewitched you?" Clearly Paul felt that because the Galatians were so new to the faith they were vulnerable to false teachings. In other words gullible.

This theological civil war of allegiance was happening to churches all over Asia Minor as the young Christian faith struggled to find its identity, and the epistle we call Ephesians was written to address the crisis as well. The key in Ephesians chapter 4 is verse 14 that practically defines gullibility. Listen! "We must no longer be children, tossed to and fro and blown about by every wind of doctrine, by people's trickery, by their craftiness in deceitful scheming." Hear that? This is nothing less than a first century warning against being gullible!! When he says they are not to be "children," he's telling them they need to possess the wisdom of mature adulthood and not be as naïve as children often are.

Children have a tendency to "follow their heart," which sounds nice. But was it not Jeremiah who taught us that "The heart is devious above all else...who can understand it?" Our heart has a tendency to wander from the truth if it "feels good." Our heart is also tempted to believe something without question if it matches our own beliefs. And Saints, a fickle heart is an easy target for those who live to deceive! A strong believer will know there is often a big difference between what he or she desires and what the scriptures tell us God desires. A strong believer will question everything, to test if it adheres to God's will and is done in the spirit of love.

When the writer says "...tossed to and fro and blown about by every wind of doctrine..." he's describing what happens when a person is not educated in the scriptures or wise in the ways of the faith. Those who don't know the scriptures are easily led astray by one who plots to take full advantage of their ignorance. Those who do not "get it" when it comes to the basic tenets of our faith are easily led astray by any smooth talker in a tailored suit who

comes along. Substitute a toga for a tailored suit and that's precisely what was happening in the churches of 1<sup>st</sup> century Asia Minor. Like a ship in a storm at sea, gullible persons will be subject to damaging waves and the destructive winds of false doctrine. The result will leave them lost at sea at best, shipwrecked upon the rocks at worst. And when the letter warns them not to be taken in "...by people's trickery, by their craftiness in deceitful scheming," he is describing the unscrupulous religious scam artists who deliberately swept into the churches to take full advantage of gullible parishioners!

Saints, when we allow ourselves to be conned, scammed, or deceived into wasting our time, talent, and treasure on things that are not of God's Kingdom, that is time, talent, and treasure not spent on the Kingdom of God! It is time, talent, and treasure wasted! What is the sin in gullibility? It is the failure to put in the effort, to do the work we need to do so that we do not become the victims of those who try to sell us a bill of goods who preach a false doctrine! How do we achieve this? Well, unlike the easy fixes that scam artists promise, I'm going to be straight with you- the life of a true disciple of Jesus Christ is not an easy one! Jesus of Nazareth, who was clearly the opposite of a scam artist, was always clear about that. In Matthew 16 we hear, "If any want to become my followers, let them deny themselves and take up their cross and follow me. For those who want to save their life will lose it, and those who lose their life for my sake will find it." I dare you to try to candy-coat those words. True Christian discipleship takes a lot more than tuning in for an hour on Sunday morning. It takes more than a token offering. More than a church membership certificate. And despite what some scam artist preachers may tell you, genuine faith in Jesus has never been a ticket to instant riches.

But O Saints, genuine faith is so much more than anything a scam artist can ever promise! Because once we get it, once we open up and allow that unconditional love of God into our hearts, all those fears, all those lies, all those doubts that have held us back melt away and we will finally possess that "pearl of great price," that Jesus promised to those who earnestly seek him. We will finally sense that "peace that passes all understanding" that Paul wrote to us about. We will finally realize our worth as one made in the image of our Creator, called to a mission worthy of such a claim!


In the epistle called Ephesians we are told to "...lead a life worthy of the calling to which you have been called, with all humility and gentleness, with patience, bearing with one another in love, making every effort to maintain the unity of the Spirit in the bond of peace.

The keyword here is "worthy." When it comes to worthy discipleship there are no shortcuts! So let's study the scriptures! Let's take up our cross! And once we do, we will leave all gullibility behind!


