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SERMON OF THE MONTH

"Bridge Over Troubled Water"

Lessons from Sarah and Abraham's Story, Genesis 18 & 22

(Preached on Saturday, May 29, 2021 Peace with Justice Week-Memorial Day Weekend by Pastor Rosie Pang Sermon did not broadcast properly due to technical glitches with a hardware.)"

How many of you know and love this song? One of my favorites. The lyrics of the song goes like this: When you're weary, Feeling small, When tears are in your eyes, I will dry them all, I'm on your side, When times get rough, And friends just can't be found, (Chorus) Like a bridge over troubled water, I will lay me down, Like a bridge over troubled water, I will lay me down. When you're down and out, When you're on the street, When evening falls so hard, I will comfort you, I'll take your part, When darkness comes, And pain is all around, Like a bridge over troubled water, I will lay me down.

Yes, this is a secular song, too bad it never made it to a hymnal. But it is gospel-influenced, gospel-inspired and when they created the song, they put scholarly efforts to it to their artistic perfection. Every word of it sings to me of Christ. Jesus who is the bridge between God and the world is asking you to be the same bridge to connect the world to God.

My troubled water was... When I was a sophomore in High School in the Philippines, my parents had to make a decision to go back to South Korea where my older brother began prepping for his college admission. I remember having to readjust to completely different, tough school system, schedule, people and felt helplessly lost in space and alone. I would often go into my new school before anyone arrived so I can slip into a chapel where no one came by, alone. Even the time in the Philippines was not easy when I first got there in 7th grade and just started to feel like I had a sense of belonging, my small group of friends, got comfortable with the new language and fluent in their culture. That was not even that long ago and now, repeat that all over again, alone. I felt abandoned and uncared for. Day after day, morning after morning, my seat in that dark chapel grew warmer as my hope grew dimmer. I was anxious and worried. My life now and my future was in trouble. My soul was restless and lacked peace. In all possible ways, my ground was shaking and I was in deep troubled water.

When you web search the title "Bridge Over Troubled Water" and look for movies, these two results pop up. One on the left is a documentary in foreign language released in 2013 about a group of young children volunteering to take part in a nationwide competition to bring hope in their forgotten town while another group of foreigners with the same goal in mind spearhead a project of hope with their love of exotic cuisine. The movie one on the right is a world war II movie which takes place around the Burmese border (modern time "Myanmar") featuring a famous bridge over Kwai River.

As you see here, we have troubled waters with two completely different contexts. If you have seen The Bridge on the River Kwai, or have lived through World War II, or know of war veterans, refugees and victims, you'd naturally



relate your trouble to battlefields, warfare, severe wounds, corpses, killing, lots of blood and most likely post-war traumatic stress disorder. At the same time, problems that don't involve such extreme measures may not seem much of a "trouble." However, the story of the young children and foreign mothers' fight to restore hope for their dear community and my

desperate high school days are no less of a trouble. Every challenge is like rough currents of water, some do swallow you alive.

The country's state of water / Global issues... The trouble of our time we're in addresses another clear and present danger. This pandemic and the mass shootings, bias and intolerance on another race and now the hate crimes rising against Asian Americans and Pacific Islanders are plunging all of us into the deep end without a moment to waste. In order to preserve generations and humanity, save our children and the vulnerable from what threatens their safety, we must lay down that bridge to respond immediately. So if you are on the bridge, don't be so quick to avoid those still in the water to cross over. If you do not help the next person from the bridge you're standing on, if you bypass to provide that relief, if you don't stop and listen, if you don't extend your arms to those in troubled waters and pull them out of their troubled waters when you happen to cross the bridge, you're not only missing out on the opportunity to be the bridge over troubled water. And the person you neglect will in fact drown, or to say the least have to last in their deepening trouble even longer.

If you've been spared and saved by God's grace and have faith that God is with you, gives you strength time to time, if God's truth has set you free from your past and worries, fear, and resentment, know that God is in control; if you have Jesus as the bridge over your troubled water, stop acting like you're still in the water! You are standing on that bridge and no longer drowning but some of you can't get your mind out of the water, why?

It's not that simple, is it? Well, think of a veteran who returned from World War II, Vietnam, Korea, the Gulf coast or the Middle East. Even when they leave the battlefield and come home back to their country, back to their families, they're not really back. The experience wounded them and some too vividly traumatic that they relive the battlefield over and over. As the medals go to those who survived, rather than standing tall in pride, they kneel low for their comrades with the weight of guilt and peculiarity. They also realize that the world they return to is not the same world they left. These veterans come back from war to combat just to live on. And inevitably, although many of us are not veterans, we find ourselves right back at another troubled water! If it's not with me, one of family members get ill. Even if it's not this nation, another country gets a Covid resurge. Can we ever survive a Rip Tide?

Genesis 18 & 22...Sarah and Abraham's water begins to be troubled when those three men approach the tent they stayed at. Wait. Did you just say troubled? You mean in a good way right, Rosie? Well. I see this text a little differently today because as a woman and if I were of Sarah's age, at 99, the last thing on my mind is having a child. And husband like Abraham, you know he's got some issues too. He lies periodically, he's got a mistress, and oh, what else? Oh yeah, indecisive. I don't know about you, but honestly, I would NOT be asking for a child if I were Sarah. She did ask long time ago. She did want a child, but again, long time ago. It was on her prayer list fifty years ago? At 99, She's got things together, comfort of her tent, and I certainly don't think she would sign up to raise a baby with a husband always bringing home unwanted guests without asking. But those three men kept on insisting Sarah that she'll have a child by next year. No wonder Sarah laughed. Wouldn't you? Sarah didn't have to laugh at God. Sarah laughed at those ridiculously naughty visitors! Naughty or nice, Sarah's womb was preparing for a child and quickly filling up with water.

I invite you to read on Genesis because what happens during Sarah's pregnancy will strike you with thunder and lightning bolt. If you're in a pool, get out before you read the rest of chapter 18 and 19 'coz Sodom and Gomorrah happens. If the book recorded events in chronological order, Sarah goes through her maternity watching or at least hearing of the destruction of Sodom and Gomorrah. Genesis 19:28, 'He looked down toward Sodom and Gomorrah, toward all the land of the plain, and he saw dense smoke rising from the land, like smoke from a furnace.' Can you imagine what your OB-GYN will say to you going any near a judgment day? What's worse than stress during your pregnancy? More stress! Chapter 21, Isaac was born.

I want to turn your attention to Abraham for a moment. During the time before Sodom and Gomorrah was destroyed, Abraham does something we should all give him significant credit for. He mediates with God in efforts to save the righteous from being swept with the wicked. When God tells Abraham if there are fifty righteous men, God will hold off on the judgment, Abraham gets busy to start recruit. Then he sees less and less of a chance to find all

fifty. He begins to plead bargain. You see, what Abraham is doing is exactly what we should do. Plea bargain? I mean mediate. Talk to God on others' behalf. He was laying down a stone for others to cross over with him. That's precisely what Jesus did for the world. Abraham knew that God listened and that God was with him. He knew that God's mercy and grace has given him second chances to make him a better man today than he was last year. In fact, he and Sarah had just heard an answer to their ancient prayers that proved to them both that God hears every cry and desires of your heart, even the timing may be a little bit off your grid. So Abraham stood with God and followed God's instructions because he knew that God would lead him to the right path; the path of life and redemption.

As someone who was on a bridge of salvation, Abraham took up a rock and laid it one stone at a time to extend a chance to life for others to cross over. He bargained to forty people. Then thirty, twenty, and ten. But to no avail, the people of Sodom shamelessly turn hostile toward the visitors who were staying with Lot. God is merciful and God is Love. But don't be mistaken that God will simply blindfold the sin of hostility.

All the men of Sodom came to Lot's demanding to abuse his visitors for fun and sports. What does this signify? They wanted to take advantage of those who were vulnerable. Unlike Sarah and Abraham who offered extra hospitality toward the three visitors, these so-dum I mean Sodom people just offered hostility. They outnumbered these visitors to bully them, threaten them and hurt these foreigners who were seemingly weak. Little did they know. Lot does what is ethically correct and that is to protect these visitors to his best and tries to persuade those wicked neighbors from doing any harm. And you know the rest of the story. Burning sulfur storm outside of Lot's family. So you know what? As the Hebrew scripture echoes repeatedly and as how Jesus also teaches all his followers, look after the weak, the sick, the orphans, the hungry, and don't be hostile against strangers, bereaving, and children.

What is your troubled water?

In chapter 22, another trouble comes to Sarah and Abraham and that is when God calls to give up Isaac. What in the world is this about? We'll go into this another day. But the sense of trouble is clear here. What is your troubling water? Do you know of anyone and what their trouble is? You see, if you're the one the water is pulling down, you cannot rescue yourself. And if you're on a bridge and happen to see someone in the troubled water, make sure you do what Abraham did. Mediate. Intervene. Help. Pray. Do something. Jesus laid down his life for ALL, the good, the bad, and the in between. The innocent, the perpetrators, and everyone. Jesus laid down his life to be the bridge to cross God's love over to the world.

The trouble we as a church is going through is a generation of drifters. Many young people sail off and are turned off by some of the hostile and unethical decisions churches make as much as how indecisive some of us are. But they do get caught in a Rip Tide and is impossible to make their way out of the water on their own. Friends, get out there and look out. When you see someone in troubled waters and you can't swim to them, bring the bridge to them-the Bridge of Jesus Christ. God is our refuge and strength, a very present help in trouble. After all, Jesus does have a middle name. Lifesaver.

Prayer: We have failed, we have rebelled against your love, we have not loved our neighbors, and we have not heard the cry of the needy. Forgive us, we pray. Free us for joyful obedience, through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen.

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
