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

## **SERMON OF THE MONTH**

## "Thoughts and Prayers and Actions"

(Preached on Sunday, June 12, 202)2

### James 1:22-25

"...be doers of the word, and not merely hearers who deceive themselves. For if any are hearers of the word and not doers, they are like those who look at themselves in a mirror; for they look at themselves and, on going away, immediately forget what they were like. But those who look into the perfect law, the law of liberty, and persevere, being not hearers who forget but doers who act—they will be blessed in their doing."

Saints, I know you've heard me say this time after time after time, but here it comes again-biblical faith has *never* been about the words alone; it's *always* been about action! The Bible cannot be more clear- we can never separate our faith from the actual doing of ministry.

AS most of you know, I'm fascinated by the culture of the Ancient Pueblo Native Americans. Over the years I've embarked on numerous adventures in the canyons and deserts of the American southwest with a crew of friends who share the same interest. For years, we would look at photographs and read accounts of a magnificent work of ancient primitive art far out in a deep desert canyon known as Grand Gulch, and we would dream about making the 6 mile hike through the sagebrush, down a steep switchback, and onto the dry river bed to make our way there. Last fall we made up our minds to not merely read about Big Man Panel; we determined to get there.

Well, to make a long story short, because we took action, our faith was rewarded! With a couple of gallons of water on our backs, early in the morning of June 8<sup>th</sup> we drove to the trailhead in Bears Ears National Monument, left the car and followed a rough map for six miles until we looked up to the cliff panel on our right and there it was-two imposing life-size figures staring down at us! Incredible! Rather than merely reading about Big Man Panel, that day we made our dream a reality. We put our faith into action and were rewarded.



As I mentioned, the Bible is very consistent when it comes to faith and action. Faith simply doesn't exist without some form of action attached to it. And what James tells us is that faith and action is a two-way street; each both feeds and feeds off the other to strengthen one another. Faith without action dies on the vine like an un-watered tomato!

Check out James once more:

But be doers of the word, and not merely hearers who deceive themselves. For if any are hearers of the word and not doers, they are like those who look at themselves in a mirror; for they look at themselves and, on going away, immediately forget what they were like.

What is faith without works like? Well, it's like having a best-selling cookbook and picking it up every once in a while and reading a recipe, and thinking, "Now that sounds delicious!" And you put the cookbook down but you never actually try the recipe! And this gets repeated- a different page, a different recipe, day after day, week after week, month after month, year after year...

But here's the thing, here's what James is telling us: unless you at some point make up your mind to actually cook that recipe, it will eventually fade from memory and never be of use to you! Unfortunately that's what the Bible is like to many "Christians." It's a cookbook that's read every once in a while, but never put into practice!

Saints, unless we engage in the actual "doing of ministry," the words of scripture will evaporate to nothingness, and what we call our faith will be nothing more than a faded memory.

That's what the Bible is like to faith-without-works "Christians." And what is church to such so-called believers? Worship services are like turning on HGTV and watching your favorite cooking show once a week. We turn it on and listen and watch the chef explain how a certain meal ought to be prepared. And we say, "Oh, that looks scrumptious! I'd really like to try cooking that!" But once the show ends we just turn off the TV and our enthusiasm fades to indifference, and finally inaction. And sadly, next week we'll turn the show on again and repeat the same tired old routine. All watching; no doing, ad infinitum.

Put simply, what James is telling us is at some point, if we want refer to ourselves as a cook, we actually have to try cooking something! If we want to call our ourselves a people of the Christian faith; we need to actually practice that faith, for it is only in the doing, only in the actually process of bringing God's recipes to completion, that our faith itself will be both strengthened and rewarded! Saints, when we take the time to read the recipe, gather the ingredients, mix them all together in the right amounts, heat the stove or oven, wait until the timer goes off and finally place the finished meal on the plate, only then will we actually be able to say, "Hey, know who I am? That's right-I'm a cook!" So what does it look like when there's actual cooking going on?

Yesterday, June 21<sup>st</sup>, thousands of demonstrators gathered at the National Mall in Washington, D.C., while thousands of others protested in hundreds of other cities in at least 45 states in the "March for Our Lives" protest against gun violence, spurred by the horrendous mass murder of children and teachers that took place in Uvalde, Texas.. Naturally the question is, what role should we, the church, do about our children and teachers being gunned down time and time again in their classrooms, or what should we do about the thousands upon thousands who die every year by gun violence in this country, year after year after year? Is doing nothing even an option?

Not if we read Proverbs...listen!

If you faint in the day of adversity, your strength being small; If you hold back from rescuing those taken away to death, those who go staggering to the laughter;

If you say, 'Look, we did not know this'—
Does not he who weighs the heart perceive it?
Does not he who keeps watch over your soul know it?
And will he not repay all according to their deeds?

Saints, I ask you, can it be any clearer? The typical response from so many politicians and pundits whenever an event such as what happened in Uvalde is: "Our thoughts and prayers are with them." Well, according to everything the Bible teaches us about our faith, that's not enough. In fact, according to the Bible, such a response is pathetic. Now that doesn't mean we shouldn't pray for those whose lives have been devastated by gun violence. Prayer is such a vital part of any follower of Jesus! But what scripture tells us consistently, throughout both the Old and New Testaments, is that whenever there's an opportunity for action, thoughts and prayers alone are not enough. In fact, prayer alone can turn into a convenient excuse not to get off our butts and act!

Saints, I'm not sure what it is we of New Dover UMC will do about gun violence, but this I do know- we MUST do something. We've been praying for an end to gun violence every week, for years on end, and still it goes on unabated. Isn't it obvious? Are we are not called on to do more than just pray? Are we not called on to put our faith into action? And once we determine to do so, not only will it make a difference in the world, but it will both strengthen and reinforce our faith itself. Then, like the one who not only calls him or herself a cook, we become the one who actually makes the recipe! We go beyond talking about being a disciple and actually become one!

Again, the words of James:

Saints we of New Dover have proven to be a church that doesn't just hear the word and forget about it once we leave the sanctuary; we act! We don't just pray for neighbors who are hungry- we feed them! We don't just pray for out shut-ins and patients in hospitals and rehabs- we visit them! We don't just pray for our global neighbors- we send them bicycles and sewing machines so they can work, or we build them an ICU room in Vellore, India that will save lives far into the future! We don't just pray for the people of Los Cocos, DR- we send them dozens upon dozens of boxes of supplies and build them homes to live in. We don't just pray for our New Jersey neighbors in need of home repairs- we send a COP crew to put on new rooves and siding!

Saints, we have done much to build God's Kingdom here in Edison and around the world, but let us always strive to do more, because the greater the action- the greater the blessing! My friends and I were rewarded for making the challenging hike to Big Man Panel this month; it's an experience we will never forget. Saints, so too will our service together at New Dover be a time we will never forget, so long as we continue to live out the promise of our faith!

### IT'S ALL ABOUT THE BELLS

Summer's almost over and it's time to dust off the tables, spread out the pads, open up the cases and ring our bells again. Bell rehearsals will begin on September 11 and we need your hands to ring the bells.

It may have missed your notice but our young ringers are now adults. They have graduated from high school and are moving into their young adult world and activities. Some will still be near by but they can't always be here. We need you!

Like anything else worth doing, bell ringing is a commitment of time to learn the music and to bring the best we have to the worship experience. When we ring it is not a performance but rather it is a ministry, bringing God's love and your gifts together. New ringers are supported by their Ring Partner at all rehearsals and when ringing in church. Bell ringers build a bond grows closer with each new musical experience.

#### Who can ring?

Anyone age 6 and up can be a ringer at New Dover. We welcome families to join together and share in this wonderful experience.

### Where and When are rehearsals?

We practice every Sunday following the worship service in the Music Room.

11:30 -12:30 Silver Bells and Golden Ringers (age 6 to retirement)

12:30 – 1:00 Jubilate Handbell Choir (age 16 to retirement)

#### What if I can't make every rehearsal?

We begin and end rehearsals on time so that each ringer may plan their day.

From time to time ringers have other commitments that require their time and attention. Each ringer is expected to inform the director (via text) as soon as possible if they cant make a rehearsal.

#### When do we ring?

We generally ring once a month from September – June.

On ringing days we practice at 8:00 in the sanctuary rather than after church.

Occasionally we visit other choirs to ring with their choir during morning worship.

#### What does it cost?

\$20.00 annually for our bell shirt. (These are purchased in the Spring). All music and required equipment, including gloves, are provided by the church.

If you have any questions about being part of this ministry please contact Alice Bennett 732-216-7587 or, better yet, just stop into a rehearsal and see it live and in person.

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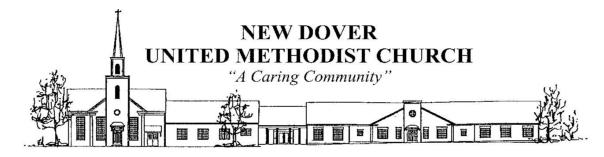
